Remember – The 2025 Youth Art Show and Contest sponsored by Keep Columbus Beautiful and Columbus Garden Club will be September 10 – 19 in the Live Oak Art Center, 1014 Milam St. Youth art show opening and reception will be Friday, September 12 from 5 to 7 PM. All garden club members are invited to the reception. Help show your support for our youth and support Keep Columbus Beautiful, a project of Columbus Garden Club. The event features the first annual Poster Contest and Recycled Materials Art Show. It invites all student artists grades 1-8 to apply to the contest and exhibit and to create and showcase artwork featuring the Keep Columbus Beautiful message. Youth are invited to create posters (8-1/2 x 11) featuring a Keep Columbus Beautiful message; Please Don't Litter; Reduce, Reuse, Recycle; Keep Texas Beautiful, Don't be a Litter Bug. Youth are also invited to create Recycled Art (canvas or sculpture) utilizing recyclable materials in the Recycled Materials Sculpture Contest.

The Live Oak Art Center will also include "Adult Recycled Art" for exhibition only. This is a late addition to the show, but an exciting addition. Examples of adult items currently ready for the show include Texas Flag created from headboard of bed, a wooden box created from dead tree removed from Court House Square, YoYo Quilt created from fabric scraps and a Zebra painted created from recycled Goodwill canvas. Columbus Oaks Readies for Fall Gardening



Wanda Anglin worked with Kris Steward, Activities Director at Columbus Oaks, and Rex, a charming resident of the center and gardener extraordinaire, to evaluate the two raised bed planters' readiness for fall gardening. At their request, Wanda picked up fall seeds including greens, chard, lettuce, and carrots, from the Sprout to Share Free Seed Library and delivered them to Rex.

She also purchased soil and compost for the raised beds from Take Root and added the bags to the empty bed using the bags to line areas where there were gaps allowing soil to escape. And the second bed got a side dressing of compost as there were cantaloupes growing in it. 2 bags were left beneath the planter for them to add to the bed once the cantaloupes come out.





Texas Wildflowers

Texas is renowned for its vibrant wildflowers, particularly during the spring blooming season from March to May. Iconic species include the Texas Bluebonnet, the official state flower known for its royal blue blooms, and the fiery red-orange Texas Paintbrush. Other common Texas wildflowers include the yellow Texas Yellow Star, the delicate Pink Evening Primrose, and the conical Purple Coneflower, which attracts pollinators. You can enjoy these blooms at various locations like the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center in Austin or by visiting Wildseed Farms in Fredericksburg, which also offers wildflower seeds.

Wildflower seeds should be sown in late August and September. Doug Welsh says "Texas is lucky to have one of the largest wildflower seed companies in the nation. Wildseed Farms (located 7 miles east of Fredericksburg). John Thomas, founder of Wildseed Farms , has the unique perspective of a successful rice farmer who realized the many benefits of using wildflowers on roadways, commercial landscapes, and home gardens. He describes himself not as a wildflower lover but "a user of wildflowers" to create beauty, traffic stopping color, and reduced mowing requirements for road crews, landscape maintenance professionals and you, the homeowner."

Member in the Spotlight



Janet Johnson – I remember all the years I had to write an "All About Me" paragraph as a student and a teacher. Why did I want to become a teacher was always the main topic I tried to zero in on. So, why did I become a teacher? Truly I guess it was from watching my mom teach elementary Sunday school all my life at our church in Houston. I was always helping her in VBS as I got older and I enjoyed working with the kids. When I went to Texas Tech University I did not go in as a teacher but I quickly changed my major to Physical Education because I loved playing sports and teaching sports to others but, it did not end

there. I took an adaptive physical ed course and got to work with kids at the Lubbock State School and I was hooked with working with special ed. kids so I added special ed. to my major. My first teaching job was for Alief ISD in Houston teaching students in resource for two years. I transitioned to a self-contained emotional disturbed unit within the same school for nine years. The days were long and hard at times but to see your students work on their behaviors and learn was a huge reward. My love for gardening started during this time as a mental break from what I dealt with at school on a daily basis. I left Alief ISD and became a stay-at-home mom for my son who was starting Kindergarten. That lasted all of four years and I started teaching again but in Katy ISD. This time around I taught 4th grade math/science/social studies/compensatory ed. and PE throughout my many years. I even went back for four more years as a supplemental math teacher and long term substitute after I retired in 2015.

I loved teaching math but my favorite was science where I could do hands on lessons and watch the excitement on their faces especially when I would bring my Monarch butterfly habitat in full of caterpillars and eggs from my butterfly gardens and they would daily see the transformation they go through. We would have butterfly release day on Fridays and from this experience I had parents ask about how to start butterfly gardens with their kids! God blessed me with 35 years of teaching that I will never regret and now our son is a Jr. High history teacher in Huntsville so he and I talk teacher talk all the time! (my poor husband)

When we retired and moved to Columbus in 2015 my love for gardening just exploded because I had so much space to work with! I joined the garden club and started learning more about gardening which led me to become a Master Gardener and now I'm just out of control and learning and applying what I can from plants to pollinators etc.


When 2020 hit and I came down with Transverse Myelitis I ended up in the hospital for five weeks and a wheelchair. It was a very difficult time for my family but God always has a plan. I was able to share with the doctors, nurses and physical therapists about my gardens, plants, experiences and several new gardens were started with them. Our Columbus Garden club members were a huge blessing for me when they would come and work on my gardens until my husband could catch his breath. As my body was healing God kept my love for gardening as my anchor for not giving up. I still had a goal to garden but I had to figure out how to redo my butterfly gardens so I could become independent and garden again. With the help of my husband, son and his friends I expanded by garden and put in raised beds and off I went again! Gardening is my therapy both mentally and physically. I have to walk to and in my garden and my new greenhouse. I'm doing more with seeds and propagation techniques and really enjoying it. I may not be able to physically do the work I once did but I try to do all I can and enjoy the life I have. --In HIS Garden, Janet Johnson

September Yard of the Month was awarded to 823 Milam. This striking L-shaped



Folk Victorian with center porch makes the most of its corner lot.

Bordered by brick and ornate wrought iron fencing, the structured garden dresses both fronts of the home. Though formal with impressive hardscaping such as a bricked walkway with planted borders set off by natural stone, the garden's native and nearnative plants lend a welcoming, casual feel. The use of drought and heat

tolerant flowering plants has this yard shining with color in late summer when other landscapes fail to thrive. Plus, the bees, butterflies, and other pollinators are very happy. The smart choices include salvias, lantanas in gold, reds, and oranges as well as lavender trailing lantana, angelonia sporting whites, lavenders, and purple blooms. An eastern redbud, though no longer blooming, offers an interesting focal point for the front.

Community Beautification Award – September
