Section A. Eligible for NGC DESIGNER'S CHOICE AWARD. Exhibitor has complete freedom to choose plant material and other components within NGCI policies. All space furnished by Committee. Each Class will have 4 separate Designs.

Special Events with Family & Friends

CLASS 1: "Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart"

Four Creative Designs, with dimension measing no less than 10 inches and not more than 12 inches. Designer choice of plant material. Background and Underlay provided by designer. Staging will be provided.

CLASS 2: A Garden Wedding – "I Do"

Four Creative Designs; with no dimension measuring less than 7 inches and no moe than 8 inches. Designers choice of plant material. Staging provided by committee.

CLASS 3: "Star Spangled Celebration"

Four Creative Design, with no dimension measing more than 6 inches. Staging will be provided.

"Breifly I will remind you that the Flower Show will be held on the morning of **November 8.** It will be held at the **Nesbitt Library**. We will have signup sheets for each of you that pledge to do a Design. The Horticulture will not need to be signed up. As members of the Club we would like everyone to participate and bring at lease one (1) horticulture entry. You have time to look around your yard and decide what you want to enter.

"I will have handouts at the coming meeting with rules for both designs and horticulture. I am so pleased to have Deborah Braden as my Co-Chairman. She is a delight to work with. Regena Williamson, our horticulturist guru, will be helping me with the horticulture section to make sure that the plants that we list in the schedule will be correct and that you all are familiar with. There will be annuals, cut plants, and pot plants accepted in the horticulture division."



National Garden Clubs, Inc, Flower Show School Course I was held on September 25, 26, 27 and 28 at the Heritage Garden Clubs Clubhouse Cottage and Garden in Friendswood. Regena Williamson attended as one of the judges who put on the flower show school and Nancy Galloway attended the school. Nancy said, "I wanted to attend this school the minute that I found out about it. I figured that not only could I work to becoming a flower show judge, but it would also help me with my flower show entries. If anyone needs help with learning how to improve their designs or horticulture entries, then this is for you. You do not have to go to become a judge, you can do what is called "auditing" the school. This is where you attend the classes but do not have to take the tests. There were a lot of people there just for that reason. "

The school consisted of:

FSS Course I — taught us things like grooming, staging, requirements for awards, etc. FSS Course I Design — we learned the elements of design, design principles, awards requirements, judging procedures and various types of designs, plus more.

Flower Show Procedure Course I – which included flower show composition, types of shows, award requirement's, etc.


The instructors were all very friendly and knowledgeable. They are all tops in their fields but made the learning fun with "stories from the trenches".


I am so looking forward to January's school!
