Landscape Design School

Course 1 of the Landscape Design School program will be held again at the George H. W. Bush Presidential Library at Texas A & M on Monday and Tuesday, February 27 and 28, 2023. Classes are held 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. with lunch and snacks included in the tuition fee of \$145.

This course is part of the Texas Garden Clubs, Inc. and National Garden Clubs, Inc. program for members wishing to attain a Landscape Consultant's rating.

The course provides insight into creating a beautiful landscape at your home. Students also learn about civic and highway landscaping. Garden club members enrolled in the course will learn in a mixed group setting with master gardeners, professional landscapers, nurserymen, and others.

Garden club members wishing to achieve the Landscape Consultant's rating should plan to successfully complete Courses 1, 2, 3, and 4. After completing the 4 couses, gardeners may refesh once a year for four years and work toward a Master Consulting rating.

Texas Garden Club, Inc. members and National Garden Club affiliate members may attend the schools to work toward a Landscape Consultant's rating. Members that have successfully completed all 4 courses may refresh once a year for four years and work toward a Master Consultant rating. To maintain this rating one must refresh at least once in 5 years.

MASTER GARDENERS who complete a course may apply for 12 hours of credit to their requirements for continuing education in their county. After completing 4 courses, they will receive the Landscape Design Steward certification.

The group also made a Field Trip to NRG's Dewey Prairie Garden which is located at a reclaimed strip mine at Donie, TX. This garden helps to provide food for the communities around the area for food challenged families.

Christmas String lights with a light bulb on the end.






Flower Show School




