Celebrating Christmas in Garden Club Style...

They say that Christmas is the most wonderful time of the year and it is, but it can also be the busiest time of the year.

In Columbus Garden Club it even begins in November when the club begins decorating the Dilue Rose-Harris historical home and Alley Log Cabin. Each year club members decorate the home and the log cabin in the style appropriate to the 1800s. The white pickett fence at the Dilue Rose Harris and the rustic fence at the log cabin are trimmed with greenery and colorful Christmas bows. It is a tradition that children from Columbus Elementary and St. Anthony's school visit these historical homes during Christmastime. Garden club docents tell them about Texas history during the 1800s and the time of the Run Away Scrape (Sept.1835-April 1836)

when locals fled the area because Santa Anna and his army were headed toward the area. They explain how families lived during that time period and how they may have decorated their homes.


This year Brenda Boehm (below) was a docent in the basement of the Dilue



Rose Harris house where the children saw how the family may have cooked, saw some of the cookware that was used, and had a look at where the family may have eaten meals. There is also a collection of artifacts that were found when some work was done on the home.

lived in this home. There is one bedroom with a very small bedroom off to the side. The bedroom has a small bed and there are toys like the children may have had.



Brenda Wyman and Janet Johnson were at the Alley Log Cabin to show the children the very rustic life style.

There is a children's tree there that is decorated with ornaments that these Columbus fourth grade students made.

Joann Obenhaus (right) and other garden club members were dressed in clothes typical of the time period.

Garden club members decorated the Dilue Rose Harris home and the Alley Log Cabin in ways that may have been typical of the times...not elaborately, but with items that were available. Cypress trees may have been used for the Christmas tree and for garnishing in areas of the home. They may have used apples or oranges and hand made ornaments.





Packages may have been wrapped in brown paper and tied with string or cord.

Jennie Pritchett, Brenda Boehm, Nancy Galloway, and Sharon Wegenhoft and other garden club members started decorating the Dilue Rose Harris home, the Alley Log Cabin and the fences around the homes back in November.

This is a long tradition for the garden club and a source of enjoyment to the community.

Cabin are all properties of Columbus Historical Preservation Trust.
Columbus Garden Club has a very long history of decorating historic homes.

It was in 1979 that Columbus Garden Club first decorated the Brandon House for the Magnolia Homes Tour's Christmas Open House and continued for 30 years until 2009 when The Club decorated the Dilue Rose-Harris House and has been decorating it for the Christmas Open House ever since. The Club has also hosted Columbus, Eagle Lake, Sheridan and Garwood elementary school children at the houses as a special event. In December of 2019 The Club celebrated 40 years of decorating historic homes in Columbus with a three-day exhibit (in cooperation with Columbus Historical Preservation Trust, Nesbitt Memorial Library, and with Columbus Chamber of Commerce) at Nesbitt Memorial Library that included mannequins dressed in period costumes; club members dressed in costume; scrapbooks through the years; display boards with enlarged pictures of Christmas decorations at the Brandon House, Dilue Rose-Harris House, and Alley Log Cabin; and a Victorian village that was put together in 2007 by club members. J. L. Obenhaus dressed in costume to demonstrate cooking in the late 1800s. The Santa Claus museum, Dilue Rose-Harris house, and Alley log cabin were open for three days for the public and for third grade students to tour.

Lunch and shopping followed.




THE FLOWER SHOW - Let's Celebrate

Differences in the FLOWERS of the Holiday Cactus!

Christmas Cactus – The flowers are usually white or red but occasionally may be yellow. The blooming time is typically in December. The Christmas Cactus has purplish-brown anthers. In contrast the Thanksgiving Cactus has yellow anthers. Flowers are symmetrical being evenly distributed around each flower tube. The flowers are more pendulous and droop straight down from the ovary.

Easter Cactus – The flowers are royal purple, red or pink and brighter than Christmas Cactus or Thanksgiving Cactus. The flowers are more starshaped than the other two 'Holiday Cactus.' It typically blooms in the spring months of April and May.

Thanksgiving Cactus – The flowers are pink, red, white or yellow and they typically bloom in November. The Thanksgiving Cactus anthers are yellow but they are purplish-brown on the Christmas Cactus. Thanksgiving Cactus flowers are more asymmetrical, protrude from the ovary and extend horizontally from the tips of the stem segments. Cheryl Rose shares this information (left) about Thanksgiving Cactus, Christmas Cactus and Christmas Cactus....which one is it?
